Medieval Trail

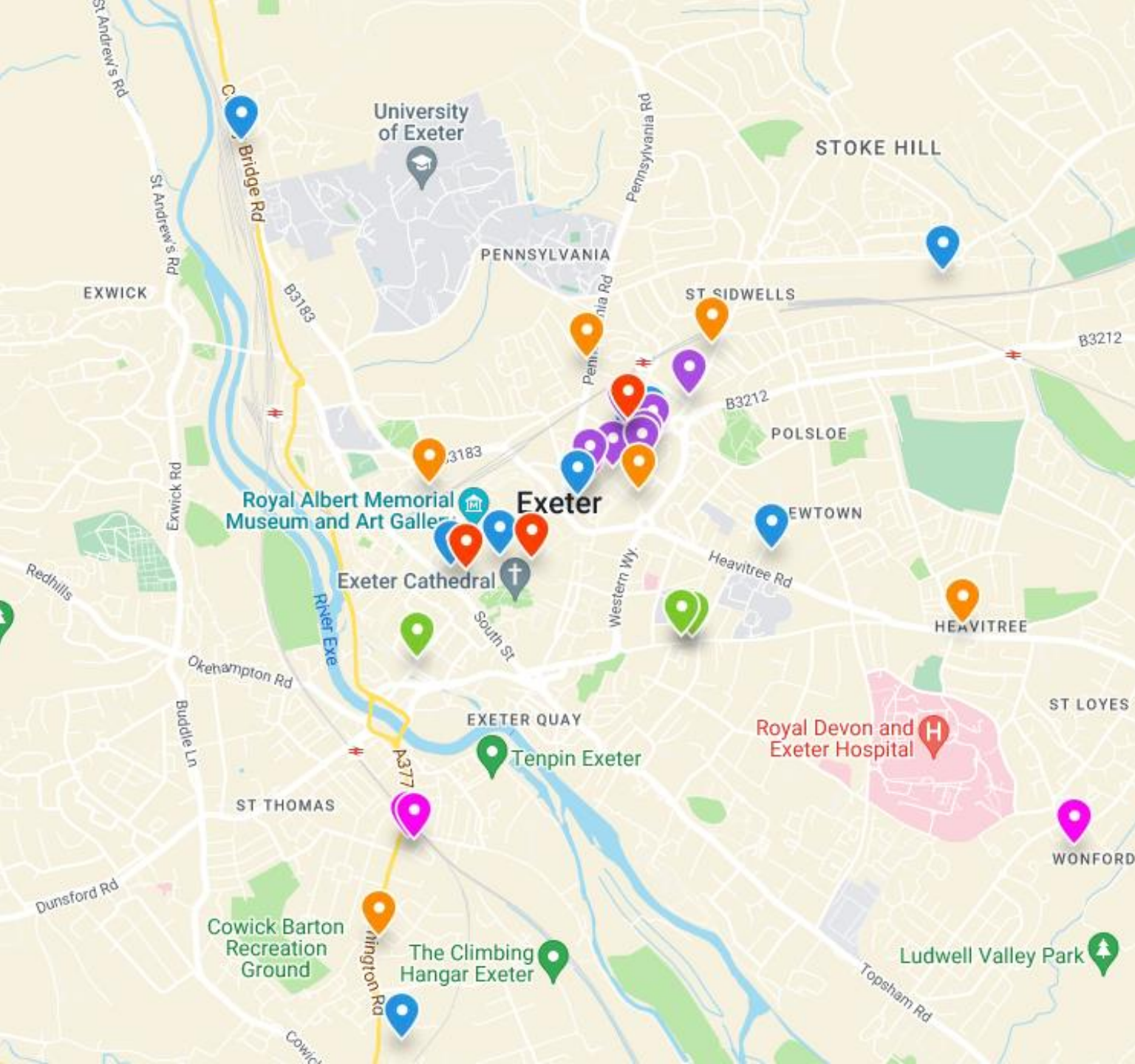
Take a stroll from Castle Street, to the Cathedral and onto Southernhay, learning about the Medieval history of Exeter.

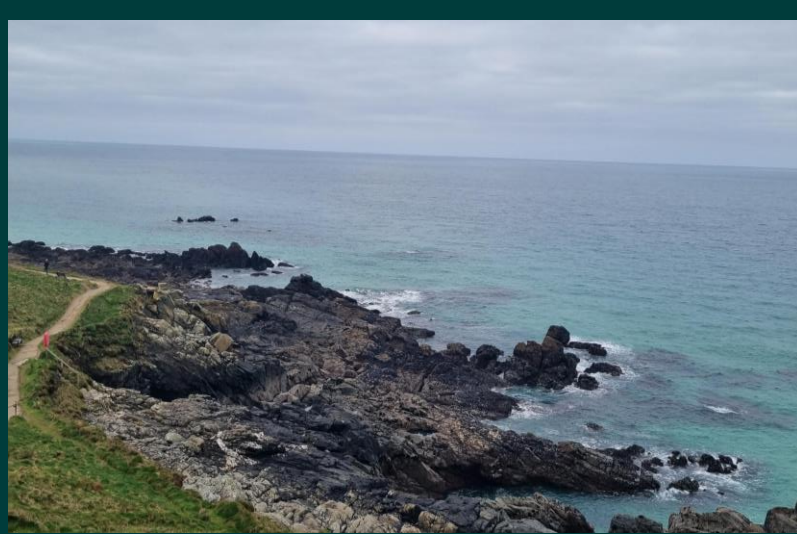
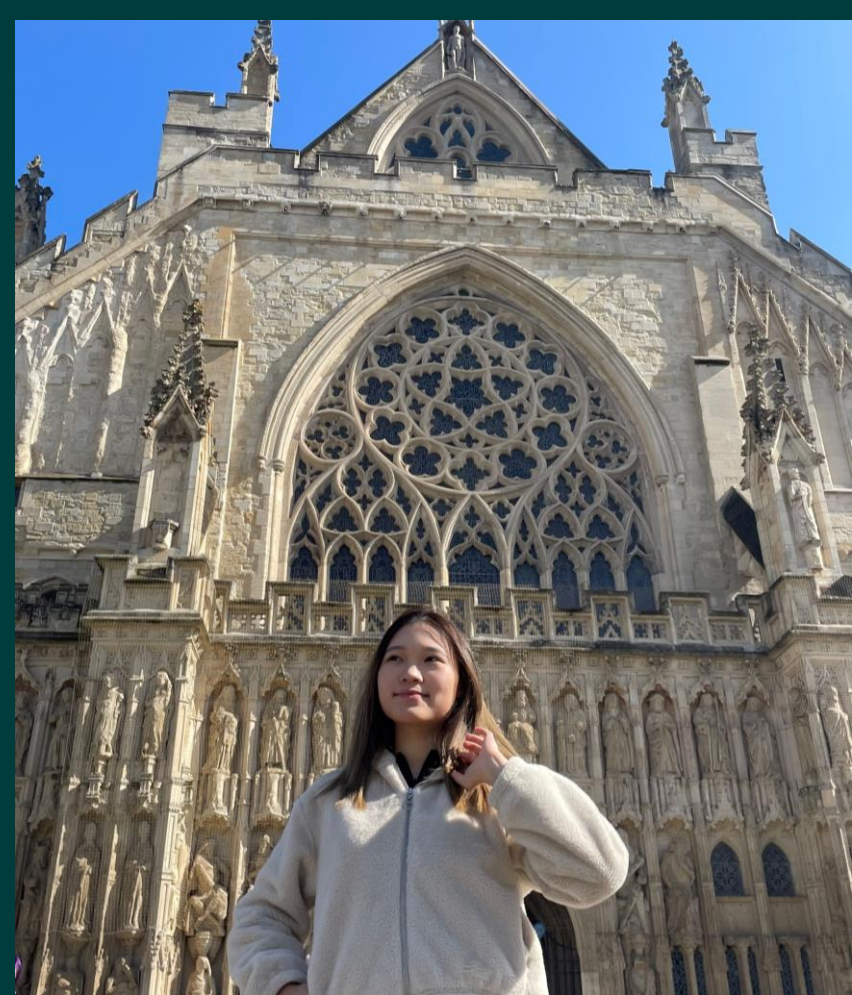

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Assessment and Assignment Submission

Follow the guidance in the module handbook to determine how you should submit assignments. If you are unsure, you must check before the deadline.

Deadlines –

Undergraduate deadlines are specified by your module convenor. The mark for a late submission will be capped at 40% (50% for post-graduates) up to two weeks after the deadline and thereafter marked at zero. Failure to submit an assignment completely will result in a mark of zero.

Assignment Feedback –

You can expect to receive feedback for all your assignments within 3 weeks of your assignment deadline.





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Extensions and Mitigation

If you feel that medical or other exceptional circumstances have significantly affected (or might affect) your performance in an exam, class test, essay or other assessment which counts towards the final mark for a module, you can apply for these circumstances to be taken into consideration

The University calls this process '**mitigation**'.

Plagiarism

- Plagiarism means copying other's work and claiming it as your own.
- It is not allowed and is taken very seriously by the University.
- By registering with the University you agree not to plagiarise or cheat in any way.
- Ignorance of the rules is no excuse!
- Use of AI – declaration

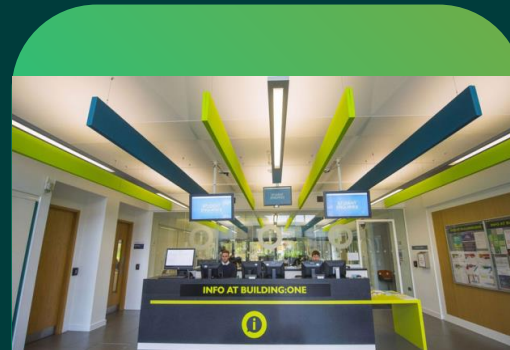

What is English Language Skills Development?

- A free academic and general English programme.
- It aims to help students continue developing and improving their English language skills to achieve their goals.
- A varied offering:
 - Courses, workshops, one-to-one provision
 - Academic English, general English, Intercultural communication
 - Digital resources
- Two main programmes:
 - Credit-rated programme – part of your module load at Exeter and counting towards your overall marks.
 - Support Programme – no credits, taken in addition to your core modules.

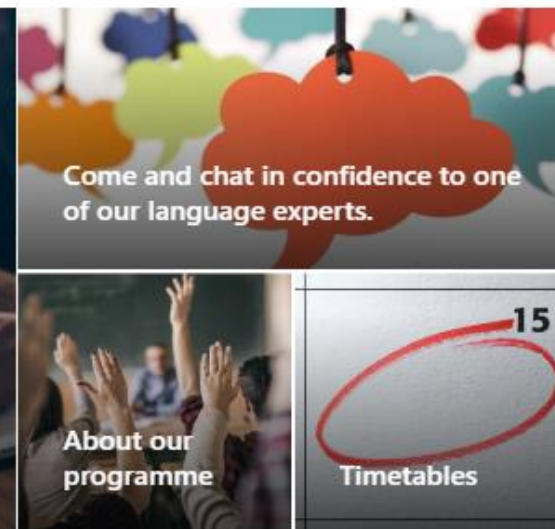

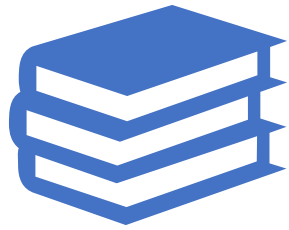
