



Moral development and social information processing: relationships with empathy, working memory and perspective taking.

Study Information Sheet

My name is Beverley Garrigan. I am a student at the University of East Anglia and I'm studying for a research degree called a PhD. My supervisors are Dr Peter Langdon, Dr Anna Adlam and Dr Sian Coker. We would like to invite you to take part in a research study I am doing as part of my studies.

Before you decide whether or not you would like to take part in this study we would like you to read this information sheet which explains what the study is about and what it would involve if you decide to take part. Please ask the researcher if you have any questions.

What is the study about?



We know that as children get older they develop different skills such as memory and decision making. We want to know how these skills are linked to each other, and how they are linked to behaviour.

If we know more about the relationships between these skills in the general population, we can understand more about problems that certain people may face, such as young people with brain injuries.

Why have I been invited to take part?

You have been invited to take part in this study because you are aged 11-18 years old.

Do I have to take part?

No. It is entirely up to you and your parents if you would like to take part or not. This information sheet is to give you more information about the study, to help you make a decision either way. Your parents will also be sent an information sheet about the study.

What will I have to do if I take part?

If you are interested in taking part in the study, your parents will be sent some information about the study. Your parents can return a form saying they would like you to take part. If your parents would like you to take part, you will then be invited to a study session with one of the research team.

At the start of this session, the researcher will explain the study and make sure you understand what you will be asked to do. You will then be asked to sign a form, saying that you agree to take part in the study.



You will be asked to complete a few different tasks. You will be asked to fill out a paper questionnaire which asks different questions about your behaviour and how you think.



You will also be asked to watch some cartoon clips on a laptop and answer questions about what you think is happening in the clips. For some questions, you will be asked to say your answers out loud.

The researcher will write your answers down and also record them using an audio recorder. One of your teachers and one of your parents or guardians will also be asked to answer some questions about your behaviour.

You will also be asked whether you agree for the researcher to talk to you about another study Beverley is doing as part of her studies. If you agree, you may be given some information about another study and invited to take part but you do not have to take part in this extra study.

The session may take up to two hours, but may be split into 2 sessions if your teachers prefer. If you need a break at any time during the study session you can just let the researcher know.

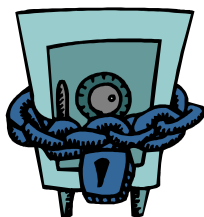


Will I be paid for taking part?



You will not be paid for taking part but you will be entered into a prize draw with a chance to win a voucher. At the end of the study, 20 winners will be chosen at random and will each win a £20 voucher. Winners will be able to choose from either a voucher for Amazon, Tesco's or iTunes.

Will my answers be kept private?



Yes. All the answers you give will be strictly confidential and will only be seen by the researcher and her supervisors.

Your answers will be kept using an ID number and so not matched to your name. Only the researcher will have a list which matches names to ID numbers and this will be kept in a locked filing cabinet at the University of East Anglia.

Your answers to one part of the assessment will be sent to researchers at the University of Bristol, who made this task so that they can score it. These researchers will only know your ID number and will not know your name or any information about you.

If the researcher thinks that something you have told us means that you are at risk of harm, the researcher may have to pass this information onto somebody.

What are the good things about this study?



By taking part in this study you are helping us to understand more about the links between different skills in young people. You will also gain some experience of how psychological research studies are carried out.

What are bad things about this study?



This session may take up to 2 hours and so you may get bored or tired. If you would like a break at any time, just let the researcher know.

If any of the questions upset you we can stop and talk about this, or stop the session if you prefer.

What will happen if I don't want to carry on in the study?

You can stop being in the study at any time, without giving a reason.

If you decide you no longer want to take part in the study, or your parents no longer want you to take part, we will then destroy we have collected from you.

What if there is a problem?

If you or your parents have any questions or problems with the study you can contact Beverley Garrigan, or one of her supervisors, Dr Peter Langdon, Dr Anna Adlam, or Dr Sian Coker. If you want to speak to someone not involved in the study you can contact the head of Beverley's department, Professor Kenneth Laidlaw, using the details at the end of this sheet.

What will happen to the study results?

This study is part of a research degree called a PhD. The results will be written up as part of a large piece of work that Beverley will hand in to the University of East Anglia. The results of the study may also be printed in a research journal.

Who is organising and funding the research?

The research is being organised and funded by the University of East Anglia, in collaboration with the University of Exeter as part of the researcher's studies.

Who has reviewed and approved this study?



This research has been considered by an independent group of people, called a Research Ethics Committee. This study was checked by the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences board at the University of East Anglia.
